UK universities have one of the most diverse subject offerings in the world.


Undergraduate courses include:

- bachelor's or undergraduate degrees (full-time or part-time)
- shorter courses such as a foundation degree etc.

Postgraduate courses include:

- master's degrees (most of them can be done in one year)
- MBA courses
- PhDs or doctorates
- professional and vocational qualifications.

Choosing a location



In the UK, there are over 160 higher education institutions to choose from, and you will find them in every location.

- Here are some of the things to consider when choosing your location:
- Would you prefer being in a city, or somewhere quieter and more remote?
- Do you have an extra-curricular passion that would suit a certain location?
- Do you have family or friends in the UK that you would like to be near?
- Have you considered cost of living in big cities?
- Do you have a preference for studying in England, Scotland, Wales or Northern Ireland?

Finding a course that's right for you



When choosing a course, think about:

- What subject are you most interested in?
- What modules and options are on offer?
- Does the course include a work placement?
- What do you want to do next?
- What grades do you need?
- Do other students enjoy this course?

How to apply

Applying as an undergraduate

Most undergraduate applications are made through UCAS.

Mid-October

- Universities of Oxford and Cambridge.
- Most courses in medicine, veterinary medicine/science, and dentistry.

End of January

Most undergraduate courses.

March

· Some art and design courses.

June

 Applications after this deadline go into Clearing, so you will not be guaranteed your first choice.



Applying as a postgraduate

For postgraduate courses, you apply directly to your chosen university in the UK.

- Complete an application form.
- Apply for as many courses as you like.
- Deadlines for postgraduate courses in the UK are flexible.

Your application form



There is a range of information you will need to provide on your application form.

This includes:

- your email address and contact information
- your education history
- your employment history
- your statement (only one)
- a reference
- any support you may need while at university.

The reference letter



Essential part of application

Ideally, should be by one of your teachers, or a school counsellor (not family or friends!)

It must discuss academic performance

Always give personal statement to the referee

Must provide a **predicted grade** for the overall Bac or diploma

Chance to explain any anomalies

Should be in English

Speaking English



The International English Language Testing System (IELTS) measures your English language proficiency.

- All UK universities accept IELTS results.
- International students are typically required to gain a score of 6.5 or above in order to study here.
- The UK's top universities can require a score of 7.5.

Other tests are also accepted depending on the institution:

- Duolingo English Test
- Pearson English Test
- Cambridge C1 Advanced and C2 Proficiency

Applying for a UK visa



As a European student, you now have to apply for a student visa through the Student Route.

- Once you have an unconditional offer and a CAS, you can apply for your student visa.
- It costs £363 to apply for this student visa outside of the UK.
- Your student visa will allow you to live and study in the UK throughout your course.
- If you study in the UK for less than 6 months, you don't need a visa, it's the visitor route

As a student from an EU country, you can use the 'UK Immigration: ID Check' app to complete the identity stage of your application.

Stay in the UK after you graduate

The Graduate Route allows you to apply to stay in the UK for two or three years after you finish your degree.

- Open to all international students who have successfully completed their degree from 1 July 2021 onwards.
- The route is unsponsored: you can apply even if you don't have a job.
- Ability to switch to a skilled work visa once you have found a suitable job.

University fees



- For international students, undergraduate fees range from around £10,000 to £26,000 per year for lecture-based degrees.
- For medical degrees, you can expect to pay up to £58,600 per year.
- Postgraduate degrees in the UK are shorter and cheaper: Most postgraduate degrees can be obtained in just one year, making them excellent value for money.
- Postgraduate degrees typically range from £15,000 to £30,000.


Scholarships and funding



The UK is no longer part of the Erasmus+ programme, but:

- Erasmus funding opportunities: the UK is now considered a third country
- Programme developed by Wales (Taith-ILEP) to replace Erasmus+
- Global Wales postgraduate scholarships
- British Council Entente Cordiale Scholarships (law studies)
- Scholarships and discounts for EU students are offered by more than 50 UK universities – check the <u>Study UK</u> <u>search engine!</u>

Always check different institutions' websites to find out what's available.



Your health and wellbeing



As part of your visa application (if your stay is longer than 6 months), you will pay an Immigration Health Surcharge that allows you to use the NHS for:

- consulting a doctor on any physical or mental health issue
- accident and emergency services (excluding followup treatments and in-patient admissions)
- diagnosis of sexually transmitted diseases
- · accessing the Covid-19 vaccine.

Its cost is £470 per year for a student visa, which can be **reimbursed** in full if you have an EHIC card (**CEAM**) and you don't work during your studies



UK Admission



UK universities operate a transparent, selective admissions process

Research **entry requirements**, including any admissions tests, portfolios, interviews

Apply through the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (**UCAS**)

5 choices, 1 application form (4 choices for Medicine and related courses)


Early application deadline for Oxford, Cambridge and all Medicine and related courses



Application **process**

Required information:

- Education history
- School reference
- Personal statement focus on your chosen subject area





September-January

Dates and deadlines:

Oxford/Cambridge and all Medicine and related courses – **mid-October**

Personal statement dos and don'ts

Other essential requirements – level 2 quals, pieces of work, portfolio, interview, auditions, UCAT/BMAT/LNAT



Personal Statement – Dos


- **Do talk about why you're a good candidate** talk about you, your motivations and what brings you to this course.
- Do be enthusiastic if you show you're interested in the course, it may help you get a
 place.
- Do make it relevant. Connect what you're saying with the course and with your experiences.
- · Do outline your ideas clearly.
- Do avoid the negatives highlight the positives about you, and show you know your strengths.
- Do expect to produce several drafts of your personal statement before being totally happy with it.
- Do ask people you trust for their feedback.



Personal Statement – Don'ts

- Don't be modest or shy. You want your passions to come across.
- **Don't exaggerate** if you do, you may get caught out in an interview when asked to elaborate on an interesting achievement.
- Don't use quotes from someone else, or cliches.
- Don't leave it to the last minute your statement will seem rushed and important information could be left out.
- Don't let spelling and grammatical errors spoil your statement, but don't just rely on a spellchecker. Proofread as many times as possible.
- Don't copy and paste make yours original.
- Don't worry about it we have all the advice you need to help you stand out in your personal statement.





- Deadline is always 15 October, every year, for University of Cambridge applications
- All undergraduate applications coming through the UCAS online application system
- UCAS (Universities and Colleges Admissions Service)
- www.ucas.com
- Admissions Tests end of September in some subjects
- Interviews take place in December

Our Applicants

- Over 1000 undergraduate applicants per year, for around 171 places
- St John's offers places in all undergraduate courses offered by Cambridge University, both Sciences and Humanities
- Applicants usually apply the year before admission

Personal Statement

- Excitement & Motivation
- Aspirations
- Intellectual curiosity
- Activities and what they meant to you
- What have you learned?
- 80% academics 20% extracurricular



Admissions Tests

- Demonstrate understanding
- Independent thinking
- Far beyond a memory test
- Large choice of questions
- Tests what you know rather than what you don't know
- Quality rather than quantity



Interviews



- Conducted by Academics
- Potential to think for yourself
- Think and argue logically
- Prepare yourself: talk loudly, be challenged on your ideas
- Engage actively in conversation
